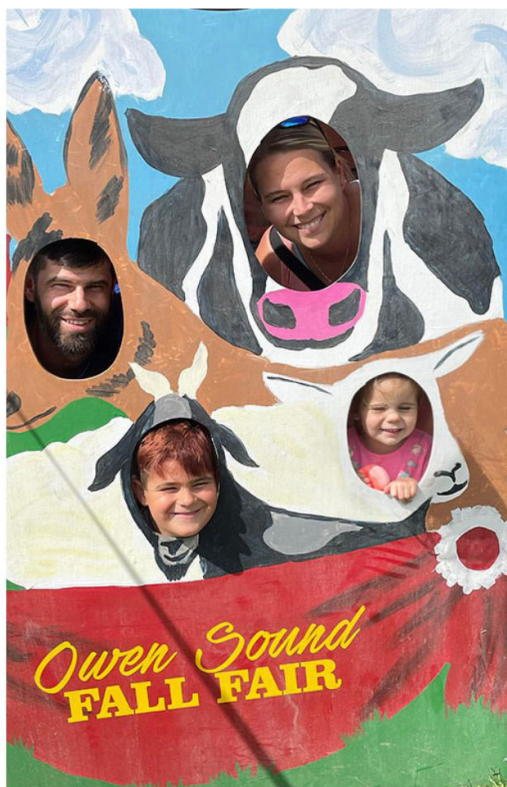

HEMOCRAFT RULES & REGULATIONS

1. Admission to the grounds as advertised.
2. The Directors will take every precaution possible, under the circumstances, to insure the safety of articles sent to exhibition, the owners must take upon themselves the whole risk, and should any article be injured, lost or stolen, while the Directors will give every assistance in their power for the restoration thereof, they will not make any payment for the value thereof, or for the injury or loss, and further the Society will not be responsible for any being injured in any way on the grounds.
3. The Directorate, or a Committee appointed by them shall have power to examine upon oath, any member of the Society against whom a protest has been entered, and if same is found guilty of fraud in connection therewith, he/she shall forfeit the right of membership, as well as any prizes that may have been awarded him, and this name shall be published in the public press.
4. It is absolutely necessary that no articles on exhibition be touched by visitors. The Directors wish to deliver their specimens to their respective owners in the best possible condition.
5. Exhibitors MUST be associate members of the Society. The cost is \$10.00.
6. All entries in all classes must be submitted on entry forms and given to the secretary. Prizes cannot be awarded unless entry forms are fully completed and submitted.
7. The exhibitors are particularly requested to have articles entered for competition in their classes properly marked and described, so as to correspond with the Prize List, in order that no mistake may be made in their arrangement.
8. No person will be allowed to interfere with the Judge while in discharge of their duties. Should an exhibitor interfere, he will forfeit all claim of any premium or award to which he might otherwise be entitled.
9. Should there be only one exhibitor in any Class, or Section of a Class, the judge, in making awards are to use their own discretion as to awarding a premium and in all cases, they must refrain from making any award where they do not think the articles are worthy.
10. Should any fraud, deception or dishonest practice on the part of any exhibitor, or his agent, be discovered, the Board of Directors may withhold any prize awarded and may prohibit any exhibitor from exhibiting for such time as they determine and may publish the names of such exhibitors if they deem it proper to do so.
11. The Association reserves the right to amend, take from, or add to these rules as in their judgment may be deemed best for the interest of the Society, and in case of any dispute the Directors' ruling must be adhered to.
12. Not more than one entry can be made by any one exhibitor in any one class in the Homecraft Classes unless specified in the Prize List.
13. Roots, garden products and fruits must have been grown during the present year by the exhibitor. All articles entered for exhibition shall comprise neither more or less than the number, nor less than the quantities named in the Prize List as to be shown and there must be no names, letters or marks on any bag or vessel containing articles entered for exhibition by which the ownership thereof can be ascertained.
14. Once exhibited, Culinary Arts and Homecraft Work may not be exhibited in the same section of the Owen Sound Fall Fair again. Factory made articles will not be allowed to compete in any class.
15. Any exhibitor who is dissatisfied with the Judge's awards may make written protest at the secretary's office by depositing a fee of \$2.00 with each protest, and if sustained the \$2.00 deposit will be returned to the Exhibitor; if the protest is not sustained, the exhibitor loses his deposit.
16. No article will be admitted to compete which does not have an entry tag previously obtained from the Secretary to attach to it. No photocopies allowed.
17. The Directors will pay to prize-winners of the amounts of \$10.00 or over, the amount of their premium, less \$10.00 retained for membership fee, if minimum of \$10.00 prize money has been earned. Provided, however that should there not be sufficient funds for payment of premiums in full, the percentage will be paid which in the opinion of the Directorate, the funds will allow.
18. All these rules will be strictly enforced.

Entry Tags: Tie tags to each container (**except design**), no tape please. Exhibitors are requested to please use suitable containers. All exhibits to be grown by exhibitors in plant and cut flower classes.*Some flowers may be purchased for use in Designs. Plants must be well established in pots and well groomed.

Those lifted from the garden and potted just before the show will be disqualified.

* Exception - Class 85.

Exhibitors may enter as many classes as they wish but may only have one entry per class

TIP: Cut begonia just before bringing to fair. Place on damp cotton/paper towel, place in bowl. Remove cotton and place flower in bowl with water to float.

24. Chrysanthemum - any cultivar - 3 sprays
25. Cosmos - 5 blooms
26. Dahlia - cactus - 1 bloom

29. Flowering Branch - not to exceed 24" in total length.
30. Geranium - 1 cut bloom with attached foliage

31. Gladiolus - single - white or cream -1 spike

33. Gladiolus - single - yellow -1 spike
34. Gladiolus - single - red - 1 spike
35. Gladiolus - any other not listed above - 1 spike
36. Gladiolus - any variety, any colour - 3 spikes
37. Grasses - Tall (growth habit is over 30") - 1 variety, 3 stems
38. Grasses - Short (growth habit does not exceed 30") - 1 variety, 3 stems
39. Hosta - Variegated (leaves only) - 3 leaves

SECTION 5: DESIGN

Soil not permitted in any design in Section 5

A design is a combination of fresh and/or dried plant materials arranged to create an artistic unit. It includes space, line, form, colour, texture, pattern, balance, rhythm (flow), proportion, scale, contrast and dominance (focal point). All designs must have fresh plant material unless otherwise stated. (No artificial flowers or soil) All designs must be able to stand alone and easily moved. *All designs open to both male and female designers.*

****Please Note: These arrangements may incorporate accessories but plant material must predominate. Do not tie tag to the design. Place it in front of the design; tuck it slightly under the design to secure it.***

Theme - Our Giving Earth

- 72. The Good Earth:** An arrangement using vegetables and foliage
- 73. Branched:** An arrangement using branch/es/twigs in a container to support plant material. Branch/es to be part of the design. No floral foam

GLOSSARY

From Ontario Judging and Exhibiting Standards Pub 2019

Collections: A specified number of different cut flowers, foliage, potted plants, branches, fruits or vegetables exhibited for cultural perfection.

Container: Any receptacle for plant material. In design classes it is an integral part of the design.

Visible Use Of Water: A design that must include water that is clearly visible. Any designs in which water is an important component.

Decorative Wood: Term used to encompass all types of wood that have been waxed, varnished, painted or treated in such a way that the surface quality and/or colour has been changed. Wood whose surface has been altered by the elements in colour, form and/or texture; dried branches; Sections of tree limbs or trunks; burls; cypress knees; palm spathes; roots and even some woody seed pods (usually tropical).

Accessory: An inorganic object(s) used in a manner to enhance the plant material. A design incorporating an accessory should appear incomplete if the accessory is removed.

Wayside Design: (from the country side) A design composed of common and plentiful flowers, foliage, fungus & weeds of roadsides and meadows.

THE USE OF SCARCE, PROTECTED OR ENDANGERED NATIVE PLANTS SUCH AS WILD ORCHIDS, TRILLIUMS ETC. REQUIRES THAT THE EXHIBIT BE DISQUALIFIED BY THE SHOW COMMITTEE. Although gardeners may cultivate scarce, protected or endangered native plants, the use of them is forbidden in show work to discourage their picking from the wild.

CONDITIONING TIPS

Conditioning: We condition plant material to prolong its life and to ensure that maximum uptake of water by stems, flowers and foliage is achieved.

Cutting Flowers: Cut on a diagonal with clean sharp scissors or knife. Cut flowers in early morning or evening when it's coolest. Leave flowers in a bucket of water in a cool place for several hours.

Hollow stemmed flowers: Invert and fill stem with water. Plug hole with absorbent cotton or wet floral foam and immerse in water.

Milky substance Flowers: Blacken the cut stem with a flame and immerse in water.

Woody stems: Peel an inch of bark and slit ends. Place stems into deep, quite warm water.

Foliage: Foliage can be submerged for several hours. Remove foliage that would be under water because decaying leaves promotes bacterial growth. Do not submerge Grey leaves. Young foliage will become water logged if left too long.

Bread Score: Flavour 35%, Crumb 30%, Lightness 15%, Crust 10%, Appearance 10%; Standard Size Pans. Breads must be 24 hours old.

Notes: No muffin wrappers, no tin foil tart liners; items will not be judged if left on. Please attach entry tags to outside of bag.

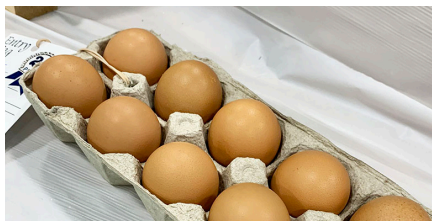

(2) Small stitch holders or safety pins and Tapestry needle

Tension 32 sts = 10 cm (4 inches) in stocking stitch using 3.25 mm needles.

**** TO SAVE TIME, TAKE TIME TO CHECK TENSION**

TOQUE INSTRUCTIONS

With 3mm needles, cast on 80 sts. Work in (Kb1.P1) ribbing for 8 cm (3 ¼ ins.)

Change to 3.25 mm needles and work on St st for 5 cm (2 ins), ending with right side facing for next row.

To shape top:

- Row 1: (K8.K2tog) 8 times.
- Row 2 and all even rows: Purl.
- Row 3: (K7.K2tog) 8 times
- Row 5: (K6.K2tog) 8 times
- Row 7: (K5.K2tog) 8 times

Continue decreasing in this manner until you have completed the row (K2tog) 8 times. Break yarn and thread end through remaining 8 sts.

Finishing: Sew back seam edge to edge. Weave in yarn end on wrong side of work. Turn or roll up cuff.

BOOTEES INSTRUCTIONS (Makes 2)

With 3.00 mm needles, cast on 46 sts.

Work in (Kb1.P1) ribbing for 7.5 cm (3 in.), ending with wrong side facing for next row.

Next row: Purl, dec 14 sts evenly across row. 32 sts now on needle.

Change to 3.25 mm needles and beg with a K row, work 4 rows in St st. Do not break yarn. Slip first 10 sts from left-hand needle onto st holder or safety pin. Wind and join a small ball of yarn and K across center 12 sts. Place last 10 sts on st holder or safety pin. Continue working center sts in St st for 15 more rows. Break yarn.

With right side of work facing, return the 10 sts on right-hand st holder to left needle. K across sts, pick up and K 12 sts along right edge of foot K across center 12 sts, pick up and K 12 sts along left edge of foot then work across rem 10 sts from left-hand st holder. 56 sts now on needle.

Change back to 3.00 mm needles and work 1 row (Kb1.P1) ribbing. Next row: Rib 20 sts, work 3tog, rib 10, work 3 tog, rib 20. 52 sts remain on needle. Work 5 more rows in ribbing.

To Shape Sole:

Next row (right side): Rib 30, work 2 tog, turn.

Next row: * Rib 9, work 2 tog, turn*

Repeat from *to* until 20 sts remain, turn.

Next row: (right side): (K2tog) 5 times, rib to end of row. 15 sts now on needle.

Next row: (P3tog) 5 times. Cast off.

Finishing: Sew back seam edge to edge. Weave in yarn ends on wrong side of work. Turn down cuff. If desired, embroider small motif on top of each bootie.



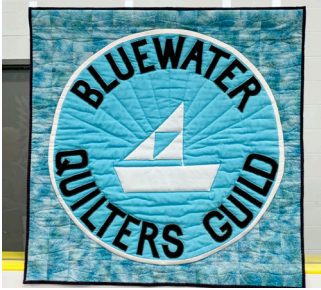

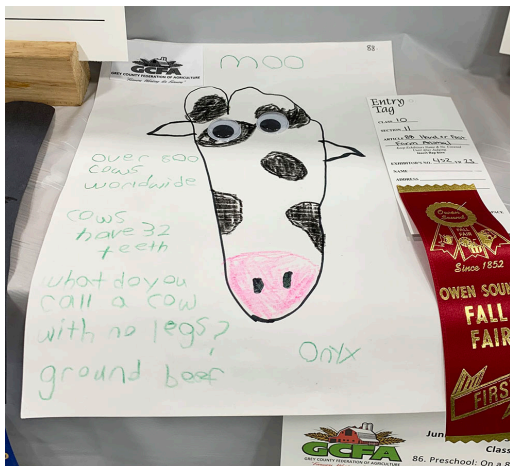
